
Congratulations to the Class of 2025 and welcome to the alumni family!

Events Supported by the Ann and Michael Hankin Fund during Academic Year 2024-2025

Through a generous gift from Emory alums Ann and Michael Hankin 79C 79G, several events were held this past year that enriched the intellectual environment of the department for our faculty and students.

Speaker Series on Local Politics and Policy: During the 2024-2025 academic year, the department hosted a speaker series focused on local politics and public policy. The series included leading scholars in American and Comparative Politics working on local politics and policy and also provided an opportunity for our undergraduate and graduate students to engage with world-class researchers, build connections, and learn how the skills they are developing at Emory can be used to address real-world policy problems. Lead faculty who organized this series included Natalia Bueno, Kiela Crabtree, Danielle Jung, Zachary Peskowitz, and Michael Leo Owens.

Southern Workshop in Empirical Political Science: SOWEPS is an annual workshop that brings together scholars in the Southeastern region who use rigorous, creative empirical methods to study important topics in political science. The meeting originated at Emory in Fall 2019 and has since been hosted by Duke, Rice, the University of Georgia, Florida State University, and Vanderbilt. In Fall 2024, Emory again hosted the workshop, bringing together PhD students and faculty from dozens of institutions around the South. Emory faculty Renard Sexton and Natalia Bueno organized the workshop.

Society for Political Methodology Annual Meeting: The departments of Political Science and Quantitative Theory and Methods co-hosted the 2025 annual meeting of the Society for Political Methodology. This is the premier research event for scholars of political methodology. More than 230 faculty and graduate students (in addition to a small number of undergraduates) from leading research universities around the world attended the July 2025 conference. Emory faculty who assisted in organizing the event included Nahomi Ichino, Adam Glynn, Pablo Montagnes, Zachary Peskowitz, and Cliff Carrubba.



New Books

Dr. Dan Reiter




In his new book *Untied Hands*, Professor Reiter explores how states advance their national security interests. Conventional wisdom holds that states must court the risk of catastrophic war by 'tying their hands' to credibly protect their interests. Dan Reiter overturns this perspective with the compelling argument that states craft flexible foreign policies to avoid unwanted wars. Through a comprehensive analysis of key international crises, including the Berlin, Taiwan Straits, and Cuban Missile Crises, and the Korean and Vietnam Wars, Reiter provides new perspectives on the causes of wars, the role of international alliances, foreign troop deployments, leader madness, and the impact of AI on

international relations. *Untied Hands* is essential reading for anyone interested in understanding how states can effectively manage international crises while avoiding the wrong wars.

Dr. Adam Glynn and Dr. Michael Owens

Professors Adam Glynn and Michael Leo Owens, with former Political Science professor Tom Clark (Stanford University), co-authored the new book *Deadly Force: Police Shootings in Urban America* (Princeton University Press, 2025). The book is based on a <u>multiyear project</u> funded by The National Science Foundation to collect original data on and understand patterns in police shootings across approximately 300 mid-to-large cities.

Dr. Tony Yang Joins the Department



Dr. Tony Yang is the newest member of our core faculty. He recieved his PhD in Political Science from Washington University in St. Louis (2024) and his LL.B., Law, from Renmin University of China (2018). Professor Yang's research examines authoritarian politics, political communication, public opinion, and political methodology, with a regional focus on China and Southeast Asia. In particular, he studies how authoritarian regimes use

censorship and propaganda to shape domestic and international information environments while avoiding public backlash against these tools. Beyond his primary research agenda, he also investigates prejudice toward LGBTQ individuals and the political consequences of their growing visibility and representation. This semester, he is teaching POLS 375: Contemporary Chinese Politics and POLS 385: China in the World.

Dr. Miruna Barnoschi Joins Department as Visiting Professor

Dr. Miruna Barnoschi will spend the year as a visiting assistant professor of comparative politics and international relations. Dr. Barnoschi received her PhD in Political Science from Northwestern University in 2023. She spent the past year as a visiting assistant professor at Tulane University. At Emory, Dr. Barnoschi will teach courses on political violence, U.S. National Security Policy, terrorism, Western European Politics, and foreign policy of major powers.
